#### **BACKGROUND:**

It is statutory for each Local Authority to prepare a Welsh in Education Strategic Plan for the decade 2022-2032.

On 15<sup>th</sup> June 2021, Ceredigion's draft Welsh in Education Strategic Plan (WESP) received Cabinet approval to go to consultation for a period of eight weeks. To avoid consultation over the Summer holidays, the consultation began on 20<sup>th</sup> September and closed on 12<sup>th</sup> November 2021.

In order to provide a full and detailed response to the comments made during the consultation, the Welsh Government needs to publish the document 'School categories according to Welsh-medium provision'. A draft copy of this document was published in December 2020 for the consultation period. However, the final copy has not yet been published, although this is expected before the end of the 2021 calendar year. The content of this document will be crucial in providing a response to the consultation on the Welsh in Education Strategic Plan in Ceredigion.

The original timetable for submitting the consultation comments and responding to them will therefore be adjusted as a result of the above. The Learning Communities Overview and Scrutiny Committee will now receive the consultation response on 17<sup>th</sup> February, with Cabinet receiving the report on 22<sup>nd</sup> February 2022.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

E-sgol is a blended learning initiative to deliver online teaching and learning opportunities using direct; real-time and interactive learning approaches. E-sgol provides support to schools around the skillsets and the range of pedagogical approaches needed to maximise the learner's experiences.

The initiative initially focussed on enabling rural schools to maintain the options of subjects where there were non-sustainable learner numbers in post-14 and post-16 learning. Initially, schools worked across a cluster of no more than six schools, which were within travelling distance of each other. The lesson was delivered using a blended learning approach, while learners were encouraged to travel to the teacher's school every half term. Otherwise, the lessons use Microsoft Teams, through Hwb, to ensure there are no unnecessary costs to the school(s).

The project has expanded considerably as a result of COVID, with more schools across Wales now receiving support. Please see the attached presentation for more details on the progress of the project over the last two years.




Freely available online collaboration tools allow for the creation of a digital classroom where pupils and teachers can communicate with one another effortlessly. Pupil work can now be assigned, completed, given 'live' feedback, submitted and marked all at the touch of a button.

#### The Teacher Leg

Relationships are key to any classroom and the e-Sgoil teacher will make every effort to visit pupils before remote teaching begins. This teacher will then build upon the school visit and seek to further develop relationships through regular in-class conversations and one-to-one interactions. The teacher will be the leader of learning and will ensure that lessons cover all areas of curricular content and are delivered in an engaging and interactive manner.

The role of the in-class facilitator is to provide in-class supervision and offer support as and when required. They will have a role in keeping pupils focussed, on task and will provide regular feedback to the e-Sgoil teacher based on their observations.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

One of the duties bestowed on Local Authorities within the Welsh Government - Shared Purpose: Shared Future: Statutory Guidance to the Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 – is Annex B – the **Statutory Guidance On Children And Young People's Participation** 



In order to meet one of the requirements of the legislation, Local Authorities are expected to work with relevant partners to:

- Support a County Youth Forum/Council as a representative body of young people to act as a channel for young people's views across their local authority and represent those views to local and national decision-making bodies.
- They should aim to be as inclusive as possible in terms of geographical spread, age, gender and to represent specialist needs and more marginalised young people.
- For County Youth Forums/Councils to operate effectively, they will need to be adequately supported by Local Authorities who should consider what support is required to do this.
- They should be informed and linked to their local democratic structures.
- They will also need to be effectively linked into national participation structures such as Young Wales, the Children's Commissioner for Wales and the National Assembly for Wales.

Children and young people have the human right to have opinions and for these opinions to matter. It says that the opinions of children and young people should be considered when people make decisions about things that involve them, and they shouldn't be dismissed out of hand on the grounds of age. It also says children and young people should be given the information they need to make good decisions. Article 12 (Respect for the view of the child - United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC)

#### **CURRENT SITUATION:**

Ceredigion Youth Service is responsible for coordinating and managing the Ceredigion Youth Council since it was first established in Autumn 2015. They meet three times a year (once each term) and host an event at the end of their year 'in office'. At present, Youth Council meetings take place virtually, but ordinarily, they would be based at the chamber in Penmorfa.

#### SPSF 3 - ANNEX B STATUTORY GUIDANCE ON CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S PARTICIPATION

This statutory guidance is issued in accordance with <u>Section 17(3) of</u> <u>the Children and Families (Wales) Measure 2010</u> and applies to local authorities both in respect of local well-being plans, and whenever they take decisions which might affect children and young people.

Local Authorities have a duty to promote and facilitate participation by children and young people in decisions which might affect them. The legal basis for this duty is Section 12 of the Children and Families (Wales) Measure 2010. It requires Local Authorities to *make such arrangements as they consider suitable to promote and facilitate participation by children in decisions of the authority which might affect them, and to publish and keep up to date information about its arrangements.* These duties can be discharged via the local well-being plan.

The <u>United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC)</u>) is an international convention which sets out the civil, political, economic, social and cultural rights of children up to the age of 18. It recognises not only their basic human rights but gives them additional rights to protect them from harm as one of the most vulnerable groups in society. The UNCRC has 54 articles. Articles 1-41 set out how children and young people should be treated. The other 13 articles set out how governments and adults should work together to make sure children and young people can access their rights.

In Wales, the commitment to the UNCRC is enshrined in legislation with <u>the</u> <u>Rights of Children and Young Persons (Wales) Measure 2011</u>. Section 1 of the Measure places a duty on the Welsh Ministers to have due regard to the UNCRC when exercising their functions. This means the Welsh Ministers must consider how what they are doing relates to the rights and obligations in the UNCRC and every opportunity has been taken to identify ways of realising the relevant rights before making decisions. Consequently, this filters down to the local level through legislation, regulation and statutory guidance.

This guidance relates to children and young people's right to participate which is a fundamental and enabling right as set out in Article 12 of the UNCRC:

Children have the right to say what they think should happen, when adults are making decisions that affect them, and to have their opinions taken into account.

#### Article 12 (Respect for the view of the child)

The articles of the UNCRC have been summarised into Seven Core Aims which should underpin the working practice of any service provision working with children and young people nationally and locally. Core Aim 5 in particular relates to children and young people's participation with the aim that:

All children and young people are listened to, treated with respect, and have their race and cultural identity recognised.

Core Aim 5

#### Requirements

In order to meet the requirements the legislation, Local Authorities are expected to work with relevant partners to:

- promote and facilitate children and young people's participation within the broad context of the UNCRC, as part of their policies, services and wider citizen engagement. Local Authorities are expected to make sure as many children and young people as possible are aware of their rights as set out in the UNCRC, including their right to participate and for their opinion to be heard, and to be involved in decision-making about policies and services which affect their lives.
- embed children and young people's participation into all aspects of planning, delivering and reviewing services. This should include the assessment of local well-being, the local well-being plan and relevant sub plans;

- adopt the <u>National Participation Standards</u>. Support for the National Participation Standards reinforces the commitment to children's rights in Wales and there are many examples of good practice of organisations which have adopted the standards as a means of ensuring participation happens meaningfully and effectively. The expectation is all Local Authorities adopt the Standards when meeting their statutory duty regarding participation of children and young people.
- publish information about the benefits of and arrangements for promoting and facilitating participation in the authority, and disseminating examples of good practice, for instance through websites and newsletters as well as social media and linking in/working with <u>'Young Wales'</u>. Children and young people themselves can be actively involved in raising awareness of the importance of participation. The Welsh Government has many resources which could support this and could be adapted to suit local needs. As well as using resources and media which is accessible to children and young people information can be included in the public services board's annual progress report;
- ensure information and materials aimed at children and young people are clear and easy to understand, answer their questions and identified needs as well as being accurate, up-to-date, relevant and accessible in terms of language and format;
- ensure a range of opportunities and the appropriate required support are provided for effective participation. The opportunities for children and young people as individuals to participate should be integrated into day to day services as well as specific participation structures such as forums for children, forums for young people, or groups/forums which represent children and young people who are marginalised, vulnerable or have a special interest in a particular issue. These forums and groups have a key role to play in supporting children

and young people to have a voice and to access their rights as set out in the UNCRC;

- support a County Youth Forum/Council as a representative body of young people to act as a channel for young people's views across their local authority and represent those views to local and national decisionmaking bodies. They should aim to be as inclusive as possible in terms of geographical spread, age, gender and to represent specialist needs and more marginalised young people. For County Youth Forums/Councils to operate effectively, they will need to be adequately supported by Local Authorities who should consider what support is required to do this. They should be informed and linked to their local democratic structures. They will also need to be effectively linked into national participation structures such as Young Wales, the Children's Commissioner for Wales and the National Assembly for Wales.
- give due consideration to the Welsh language in the promotion and facilitation of participation and as part of preparing the local wellbeing plan, reflecting its official status in Wales and the national well-being goal of 'a thriving Welsh language'.

#### Working with partners

Whilst this statutory guidance, issued under the <u>Children and Families</u> (Wales) Measure 2010 relates only to Local Authorities, we would encourage them to work closely with each of their relevant partners. Working in a multiagency way is good practice and Section 25 of the <u>Children Act 2004</u> places a legal duty on local authorities to promote cooperation with a view to improving the wellbeing of children in the area. Furthermore, <u>Section 38 of the</u> <u>Wellbeing of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015</u> also places a requirement for public services boards to consult in assessing the state of economic, social, environmental and cultural well-being in its area.

There are many examples of partners contributing to children and young people's participation and mainstreaming it into their areas of work and their arrangements for citizen engagement. #### What happens now?

The scope of the duty to promote and facilitate children and young people's participation is wider than involvement in the local well-being plan. It is important participation becomes part of policy and practice of all local partners. Local Authorities should work with local partners, including children and young people, to ensure participation is promoted and facilitated.

However, the well-being plan could set out how children and young people's participation and engagement is embedded into all aspects of planning, delivering and reviewing services and their "arrangements for promoting and facilitating participation". The public services board's annual progress report could include a summary as to how these statutory duties have been met, and how they can be improved upon. The public services boards annual progress report could consider the protected characteristics in particular with reference to age, specifically reporting on outcomes for children and young people.

The Welsh Government will monitor local arrangements for children and young people's participation. In addition well-being plans provide evidence to Inspectorates and the Welsh Audit Office (WAO) when undertaking reviews of efficiency and effectiveness of local services. Inspectorates and the WAO may also review the outcomes achieved and procedures involved to demonstrate how effectively children and young people are being listened to, involved and engaged. Children and young people have a right to be listened to, have a voice and be able to access opportunities to play an active role in decision making wherever they are – in school, out and about in the community or as users of services.

Our ambition is for every child and young person in Wales to realise their rights as set out in the UNCRC. There may sometimes be barriers to

achieving this, however, working in a collaborative way, we all have a responsibility and a role in considering ways in which these barriers can be removed or overcome. Wales has been leading the way in children and young people's participation and momentum must be maintained.

The Learning Communities Overview and Scrutiny Committee established four workstreams for raising awareness, training purposes and for identifying aspects which require further scrutiny at its meeting on 11 October 2012 as part of the forward work programme planning process. During 2014 the workstreams were reviewed and updated. The workstreams comprised of four members from the Learning Communities Overview and Scrutiny Committee and the Chairman would attend and contribute to all four. It was agreed at the Learning Communities Overview and Scrutiny Committee on the 9 November 2017 that the Modernising the Infrastructure workstream items would be considered by the main committee and that Members of that workstream would be divided into the other workstreams for 2018.

Figure 1 outlines the current workstream structure:



#### Additional Learning Needs (ALN), Inclusion & Wellbeing Workstream

#### 3 December 2021

The group received an update on transforming to the new Additional Learning Needs system. The old and new system will both operate for the next 3 years. The service have been preparing for transformation since 2017. There has been an intense

programme of preparation and training. The final version of the ALN code was published in spring 2021 and since September 2021 the transformation programme has been live, being gradually introduced for different cohorts of ALN learners. The group acknowledged that it is everyone's responsibility, the schools (staff, governors and parents) and the Council as a whole. Welsh Government only published details of the implementation guidelines from the end of November 2021.

The progress the Local Authority has made in its preparations for implementing the ALN Act was shared with the group including embedding person centred practice, developing resources, raising awareness with parents, training, development of software frameworks, and increased capacity. A powerpoint presentation is being prepared to share with school governors in the new year. The Act requires local authorities to keep "ALN provision under review". The arrangements in place to meet this requirement were discussed by the group. The guidance provided by Local Authorities on individual development plans were discussed, including early years settings, schools, further education colleges and parents. The presentation also covered quality assurance and how good practice would be shared. The final part of the presentation covered the approaches to working with post-16 providers.

### 4 A verbal update in relation to support for the Schools Service during the COVID 19 period

The Corporate Lead Officer – Schools provided Members with a current update on the Covid 19 position within schools. It was reported that

the new Infection Control Decision Frameworks for schools and colleges as from August 2021 included a national risk registry which had low, moderate, high, and very high risks.

Currently, in conjunction with Hywel Dda Health board, the schools in Ceredigion had been assessed as a medium risk with 22 positive cases being recorded in Ceredigion schools the day before.

The Chair thanked all officers and school staff for their work during this difficult time.

5 Update on three Services within Porth Cymorth Cynnar (PRU, Support and Prevention and Lifelong Learning and Skills Services) Consideration was given to the Report updating and informing the Committee on the development of the three Services within Porth Cymorth Cynnar namely the Pupil Referral Unit in Ceredigion, Support and Prevention Service and Lifelong Learning and Skills within Porth Cymorth Cynnar and as part of the Through-Age and Wellbeing Programme.

A detailed presentation on the three services were provided by their respective Corporate Managers/Headteacher on the background; staffing structure and the current position of each service.

Following questions from the floor, it was AGREED to note the report for information and to thank the officers for all their work within these services.

Officers also stated that possibly in the future Members could attend the facilities of the services to view their work, once the figures of covid 19 cases had reduced

#### 6 Additional Learning Needs strategy

Consideration was given to the Report upon the Additional Learning Needs strategy. It was reported that the New Additional Learning Needs Code for Wales was issued in March 2021 with the intention to implement the new system from September 2021. However, the implementation programme had been revised due to the impact of the pandemic.

A detailed background to the strategy was provided and that the aim of the new approach, as stated in the Code.

It was reported that due to the significant impact of the pandemic the ALN implementation plan was further reviewed by the Minister in July 2021. From 1 September 2021, the ALN system would commence exclusively for children of compulsory school age and below who:

•are newly identified as having an additional learning needs (ALN) following ALN Code processes, regardless of their setting - including those that may attend an EOTAS setting, an independent school or who are electively home educated;

•are detained;

From 1st January 2022, the ALN system would commence for children of compulsory school age and below who:

•attend maintained schools (including PRUs) in Nursery Years 1 and 2 and Year 1, Year 3, Year 5, Year 7 and Year 10) who have special educational provision via early years action / early years action plus or school action SA /school action plus SAP;

•Children who currently had special educational provision via a statement; were awaiting or were in the process of an SEN assessment; and those who were over compulsory school age, would not be included in the first year of implementation.

•The movement of children to the new system was spread throughout the year.

•Parents would not be able to request a move to the new system until 1st January 2022.

It was reported that the Local Authorities were still awaiting the final threeyear implementation guidance, which was expected to be published early in the Autumn term. This delayed guidance, was impacting the certainty of advice we were able to deliver to schools, as well as the preparation that was able to be undertaken with parents and support agencies.

Under the new ALN system local authorities had a duty to review the arrangements made by schools to meet the needs of learners with ALN. This guidance would outline Ceredigion Authority's principles and expectations for educating children and young people with Additional Learning Needs (ALN). It also provided clarity on what was expected of Ceredigion mainstream schools in meeting the needs of learners with ALN and would be reviewed by the authority. This document would form an integral part of the authority's framework for meeting the needs of all children and young people between the ages of 0 and 25.

Ceredigion was already well placed to implement many of the principles of the new ALN reforms and a list of these were provided. Also the risk that were identified due to these changes.

us

The new ALN system would operate in parallel to the SEN system, during the three-year implementation period. A review of the implementation plan and principles and expectations document should be provided, once the final implementation plan and information has been confirmed by WG.

Ceredigion's Principles and Expectations document would be presented to cabinet in due course. Members also raised concern that WG had stated that implementing these changes would be cost neutral, however, this was not the case due to the extra resources required.

It was AGREED to note the current position and to thank officers for their work in the implementation of this code.

7 GCSE and A Level results award process 2021

Consideration was given to the GCSE and A Level results award process 2021. It was reported that it was announced in November 2020 that the

traditional GCSE and A Level external examinations would not take place in the Summer of 2021. Instead, an independent panel group comprising Secondary Headteachers and other partners was put together to devise a consistent national approach for awarding examination grades for the Summer of 2021.

The system for 2021 has not simulated the system for the Summer of 2020. Instead, pupils were regularly assessed on the content of the examination specifications from March until the end of May. All secondary/all-through schools had to:

•present a detailed assessment programme to the Welsh Joint Education Committee for its approval;

•adapt and create new assessments and appeals policies;

•provide a training programme for staff on themes such as trends and data protection;

•deliver individual subject assessment programmes;

•prepare appropriate timetables, assessments and marking schemes;

•undertake the marking and moderation of all assessments;

•keep a detailed record of evidence of pupils' achievement in all assessments and all subjects

•ensure strong accountability arrangements

•enable and lead on the appeals process

•present an explanatory document to the Welsh Joint Education Committee illustrating the pattern of results compared to patterns in the past

The Welsh Joint Education Committee set thresholds where they would wish to have professional conversations with schools if interim results exceeded those thresholds. There were no professional conversations between the Welsh Joint Education Committee and any of Ceredigion's secondary/allthrough schools.

The above work was substantial and intensive in a very short period of time. We are extremely thankful to Headteachers, leadership teams, teachers and school staff for their excellent professional work in supporting our pupils during this time.

Although it is not possible to compare this year with last year, the table below notes both years, for information only.
